## DETAILS ABOUT THIS REPORT:

This informational report provides a summary of four fiscal years of work and funding details for the SRA Fire Prevention Fee. A “fiscal year” represents a one year period of time spanning from July 1<sup>ST</sup> through June 30<sup>TH</sup> of the following year. (NOTE: This report does not include a summary of Fiscal Year 2011-12, the first year the fee was enacted into law. This time was spent on program development and implementation.)

Please Note: This report has figures that represent actual and projected expenditures as of May 2016. The expenditures are accounted for by CAL FIRE administrative units and not by county boundaries. The fee collection process is ongoing and year round, and collections change on a daily basis. This report, and all future updates, will represent only current information for the date it is posted. CAL FIRE will provide updates to this report on a bi-annual basis, each January and September, or more frequently should significant changes warrant.

## **WHAT IS THE STATE RESPONSIBILITY AREA?**

The State Responsibility Area (SRA) is the land where the State of California is financially responsible for the prevention and suppression of wildfires. Comprising just over 31 million acres across the entire State, SRA does not include lands within incorporated city boundaries or in federal ownership.

## **WHAT IS THE SRA FEE?**

The SRA Fire Prevention Fee was enacted by Assembly Bill X1 29 in July 2011, to pay for Fire Prevention Activities across the State on lands designated as SRA. The fee is applied to all habitable structures within the SRA. Effective July 1, 2015, the fee has been levied at the rate of \$152.33 per habitable structure, which is defined as a building that can be occupied for residential use. Owners of habitable structures who are also within the boundaries of a local fire protection agency or district receive a reduction of \$35 per habitable structure. Over 98% of all fee payers throughout the State receive this fee reduction.

## **WHAT DOES THE FEE PAY FOR?**

The fee funds a variety of important fire prevention services in the SRA. Such activities include fuel reduction projects that lessen the risk of wildfire to communities, evacuation routes, and infrastructure. Other activities include defensible space inspections, helping communities create and update their Community Wildfire Protection Plans (CWPPs), fire prevention education, fire hazard severity mapping, implementation of the State and local fire plans, and fire-related law enforcement activities such as arson investigation. These and other prevention activities are described in more detail on the following pages. In Fiscal Year 2015-16, the fee funded over an estimated \$81.6 million of fire prevention programs and activities throughout the State.

On October 30, 2015, California Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. proclaimed a State of Emergency due to unprecedented levels of dead and dying trees in California. Based on United States Forest Service (USFS) Aerial Detection Surveys, it is currently estimated that over 29 million trees are dead due to pests and exacerbated by severe drought. This slow motion natural disaster is expected to spread substantially in 2016, resulting in an increased threat to lives, property, critical infrastructure, and natural resources.

Immediately following the Governor's proclamation, a Statewide Tree Mortality Task Force was formed to assist local jurisdictions and implement the Governor's directive. Comprised of 80 entities, the Tree Mortality Task Force represents federal, state, local, and tribal governments; non-governmental organizations; and utility and energy companies.

In response to this emergency, CAL FIRE has directed some of the SRA fee resources to assist with the local efforts to mitigate this hazard, including 19 SRA Fire Prevention Fund Grant recipients.

## **STATEWIDE FIRE PREVENTION ACTIVITIES:**

### **1. Prevention Projects and Activities in CAL FIRE Units and Contract Counties:**

- **Fire Prevention Bureaus** – Coordinate with Fire Safe Councils to create or improve Community Wildfire Protection Plans (CWPPs) and also provide support for CAL FIRE stations and personnel to engage in prevention activities.
- **Law Enforcement** – Supports CAL FIRE law enforcement activities focused on fire prevention, investigations, civil and criminal case management, and prosecution associated with fires caused by negligence or arson.
- **Education** – Support for public education and outreach, teaching homeowners how to reduce wildfire risk around their properties. Public education also includes advertising via print, radio, television, and social media outlets.
- **Pre-Fire Engineering** – Supports the development of the Unit Fire Plan through mapping, data recording of prevention projects and fire activity, increased application of fire resistive construction for structures in wildfire areas, and identification of evacuation routes and community evacuation planning.
- **Volunteers in Prevention** – Oversight of local citizens who provide services coordinated via the CAL FIRE units. activities range from assisting with defensible space inspections to patrolling on holidays and times of high fire severity.

- **Post Fire Damage Inspections** – Collection and analysis of post fire assessment data of damaged and destroyed homes to improve safety factors in building construction and land management.
- **Fire Suppression Cost Recovery** – Funding supports comprehensive fire prevention objectives by recovering fire suppression costs (as authorized by State statute) from those who have intentionally, negligently, or in violation of law, caused an unwanted wildfire.

## **2. Conservation Camp Fire Prevention Work:**

- Provides funding for fuel reduction and modification work by Conservation Camps within the 21 CAL FIRE administrative units and all 6 of the Contract Counties in the State.

## **3. California Conservation Corps (CCC) Project Work:**

- Provides funding for the CCC to conduct fire prevention in the SRA. To date, the CCC has conducted 88 projects statewide representing 223,200 hours of work. (Refer to **Chart #8** on page 20 for counties where CCC projects have been conducted.)

## **4. Defensible Space Inspections:**

- Provides for additional personnel and on duty fire engine staffing to perform Defensible Space Inspections within the SRA across the State. Inspections have also provided increased education and awareness to the public in accordance with compliance requirements of Public Resource Code section 4290.

## **5. Land Use Planning:**

- Senate Bill 1241 (Chapter 311, Statutes of 2012), authorized the establishment of a CAL FIRE Land Use Planning Program. The focus is on coordinating efforts between local fire, planning and building officials to improve effective local land use planning, and over time, to reduce the risk of wildfire to structures, infrastructure, and natural resources in SRA lands. These improved prevention measures are included in Safety Elements contained within local General Plans. Final General Plans are implemented after review and approval by the California State Board of Forestry and Fire Protection.

## **6. Fire Hazard and Fire Severity Mapping:**

- The SRA Fee provides funding for defining and updating maps of high priority areas for various pre-fire and fire prevention activities as part of a process to reduce wildfire risk to communities throughout the SRA.

## 7. SRA Fire Prevention Fund Grant Program:

- The SRA Fee funded 83 grant recipients who received \$9.5 million during Fiscal Year 2014-15 to help reduce wildfire risk related to the drought. Subsequently, 63 grant recipients have received \$5 million for Fiscal Year 2015-16. Of the 63 grant recipients, 19 received early funding to address the impacts of the tree mortality emergency. Grants are awarded to local community organizations to assist with work on vegetation treatment projects, education programs, and local emergency planning efforts throughout the State where the risk of wildfires is a threat to structures within the SRA. ## 8. Vegetation Management Program (VMPs):

- The fee funds a cost-sharing program between the State and local landowners that uses mechanical means and prescribed fires to reduce hazardous vegetation on public and private lands. This results in increased fire resilience, healthier landscapes, and improved community protection. CAL FIRE staff helps design projects, creates documents to satisfy the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), ensures compliance with air quality and other State laws, and enhances communication with Native American tribes and other local landowners.

## HOW HAS THE MONEY BEEN DISTRIBUTED?

The goal of the fire prevention program is, over time, to return fees (in the form of fire prevention activities) across the entire SRA where habitable structures exist. Fire prevention activities are based upon the priorities laid out in the 2010 California Strategic Fire Plan and administered through CAL FIRE's 21 administrative units and the 6 contract counties. The 21 units can represent multiple counties. The 6 contract counties are Kern, Los Angeles, Marin, Orange, Santa Barbara, and Ventura. These counties are provided funding by the State to provide fire protection and prevention services to SRA lands within their boundaries. A map showing the counties and administrative units can be found on **Chart #4** on page 12.

This comprehensive report prepared by CAL FIRE provides a detailed view of total fees collected along with a comparison of spending. With the SRA Fire Prevention Fee Program now well into its fifth year of implementation, this report describes the fiscal evolution of a continuously evolving statewide program. CAL FIRE has worked hard to distribute prevention funding to the highest priority projects throughout the State. As these priorities continue to evolve and projects are completed, fire prevention funding will continue to be distributed to areas throughout the SRA where habitable structures exist. Program priorities will change based on many factors, including feedback from the public and interaction with local cooperators. Future reports will reflect these changing priorities and public input and define how and where the funding is best being utilized.

In working towards the goal of returning fees across the entire SRA with habitable structures, CAL FIRE considers the totality of SRA fee funded work conducted in each of the Department's 21 units and six contract counties. This includes work conducted in the units, statewide efforts such as fire hazard mapping or land use planning, and work conducted by the California Conservation Corps. The existing fire prevention activities conducted across the State, and the attendant expenditures on fire prevention programs, compared with fees collected in each of the 21 units and contract counties was considered as one of the factors in determining the 146 grants that have been awarded over the past two fiscal years.

The following three pages contain two spreadsheets that outline fees collected and spending over the past four fiscal years (FY12, FY13, FY14, and FY15).

- Chart #1:** Total expenditures for statewide fire prevention activities. This is broken down into projects performed by CAL FIRE, the California Conservation Corps crews, SRA grants, supporting project work, and administrative costs from all State agencies administering the program.
- Chart # 2:** Total expenditures identified in **Chart #2** on page 10, broken down by CAL FIRE units and contract counties. Green columns on left show total fees and percentages collected in each CAL FIRE unit and contract county. Project expenditures for each have been broken down by fiscal year, with a cumulative total for the four year period.
- Chart # 3:** Total fees collected thus far with a comparison of total spending, including funds that remain in the fund balance.






