BUTTE COUNTY ISSUES REVISED WATER QUALITY ADVISORY FOR RESIDENTS IN BURN AFFECTED AREAS

BUTTE COUNTY, CA. – Many locations in the Camp Fire burn area remain under a do-not-drink advisory issued by local water authorities. The Butte County Public Health Officer previously issued a [water quality advisory](#) on March 19, 2019. Since then, water authorities have performed thousands of water quality tests, made progress on water system repairs and issued [water testing guidelines](#) for standing structures in the burn area.

Water authorities have lifted the do-not-drink advisory *for some* locations in the burn area and have indicated that water delivered from their water main to the customers meter meets regulatory standards for potable water. Residents are encouraged to take necessary steps to [test and evaluate their plumbing](#) before resuming regular use.

Residents with standing structures in the burn area who are still under a do-not-drink advisory or may be unsure if their location is under a do-not-drink advisory should review information issued by their water supplier online or by contacting them directly.
