Butte County Dept of Employment and Social Services	Parent Education Experiential Resource Program (PEER)	\$300,000	The program is for parents in the Child Welfare System, and their children who are in out of home care. Utilizing the Nurturing Parenting Programs @ curriculum, the classroom lessons are complimented by group activities. Parents have the opportunity to practice skills taught in the classroom during a supervised visit with their child. This helps prepare for successful reunification.
Butte County Library	Early Learning for Families (ELF)	\$55,000	Utilizing curriculum approved by the American Academy of Pediatrics, ELF has two main components "Babies Love Books" and "Playtimes". The program is designed to 1) increase the parent/caregiver's confidence in supporting early development, learning and literacy skills; 2) increase supportive parent/caregiver behaviors that promote early learning and literacy skills; and 3) increase community awareness of the library as a free early childhood and parenting resource.
Butte County Public Health	Oral Health Initiative Coordination	\$125,671	Coordinate scheduling of the Mobile Dental Unit (MDU), facilitate quarterly meetings of the Dental Collaborative and provide oral health education to preschoolers and parents/caregivers.
Butte County Public Health	Perinatal Care Guidance	\$11,803	PCG is a tri-lingual (English/Hmong/Spanish) case management program for low-income pregnant women. The program's primary goal is to provide outreach for the purpose of obtaining early, consistent and appropriate prenatal care.
CSUC Research Foundation	Fit thru 5	\$103,798	Fit thru 5 is a local collaborative working to enhance opportunities for nutrition and physical activity for young children ages 0-5 in Butte County.
Chico Food Network	GRUBbing in Preschool Gardens (GRUB)	\$57,770	GRUB created gardens at 10 early childhood learning sites. The children learn through hands-on activities that revolve around healthy, local food. Each family takes home a food item of the month, once a month. These include in-season fruits or vegetables grown by a local source, and a newsletter stating fun facts and easy recipes using that food. Support is offered up to the teachers every three months.
Enloe Medical Center	Clean Start, Healthy Beginnings	\$288,103	Primary program components include: 1) a LCSW to assess high risk postpartum mothers and provide referrals 2) a RN Educator to work in an outpatient drug/alcohol treatment program to insure adequate prenatal care and the birth of tox negative babies and 3) the LCSW and RN Educator work with high risk parents of newborns by linking families to support, education, and community-based services.
Feather River Hospital Health Center	Center for Breastfeeding Support (CBS)	\$199,971	The goal of CBS is to increase the duration of breastfeeding. Mothers have four options for receiving case management and may receive a service or combination of services, as needed: 1) Office Visits 2) Visits at Feather River Family Health Clinic 3) Support Groups and 4) Home Visits. An on-call lactation specialist is accessible seven days a week and pumps/equipment are available.
Feather River Hospital	Hospital Dentistry (performed by Dr. Gary Nelson)	\$81,750	Dr. Nelson will perform hospital dentistry on 75 high-need children under the age of six years who live in Butte County. "High-need" children include very young children, children with special needs, developmentally delayed children, and indigent children who have no other means to access these treatment services. Referrals come from a variety of sources, with priority given to those from the MDU.

Half a Bubble Out	Tobacco Education Media Campaign	\$150,000	The goals for this 3 year media campaign are: 1) education on the harmful effects of tobacco, without shaming the smoker, 2) education on making healthy choices for children 0-5, by eliminating exposure to second hand smoke and 3) smoking cessation. Each year a series of 4 media campaigns are developed. Each campaign includes TV, radio and billboard ads.
Northern Valley Indian Health	Health Promotion and Disease Prevention	\$27,500	Pilot project to train medical/dental staff on Infant Oral Health, including Motivational Interviewing, the Caries Risk Assessment Tool and fluoride varnish application. High-risk patients (under 3 years) at Enloe Children's Medical Center are recruited by physicians to establish a dental home that includes structured primary prevention regimen and Xylitol gum regimen for interested mothers.
Northern Valley Indian Health	Mobile Dental Unit (MDU)	\$320,250	The following treatment modalities are provided on a fully-equipped MDU: screenings, fluoride varnish, cleanings, sealants, all types of fillings, pediatric crowns, pulp therapy, extraction of non-restorable primary teeth and the placement of space maintainers.
Northern Valley Catholic Social Service	Butte Baby Steps	\$1,350,000	BBS is a home visitation program modeled after the evidenced based Healthy Families America Program. BBS provides assessment and home visitation services to women who are pregnant or have a newborn. Comprehensive services are offered on a voluntary basis. BBS can provide weekly and/or bi-weekly support/guidance to families so they can build the foundation needed to get their child/ren off to the best possible start. BBS provides strength-based services, promotion of positive parenting and discipline, child development and health education.
Northern Valley Catholic Social Service	Teenage Pregnancy and Parenting Program (TAPP)	\$74,652	Girls 18 years of age and under who are pregnant or have had children and male teens through age 20 who are parenting or expecting a baby are eligible for TAPP. Case managers assist teen parents by providing a full range of services. TAPP can help teen parents stay in school, get job training, plan a career or look for a job, define personal, family, and career goals, take care of themselves and their babies, prepare for labor and delivery, develop problem-solving skills, and learn about community resources. TAPP also helps teen parents obtain medical care during and after pregnancy, childbirth education, child care and counseling.
Private Industry Council	Family Friendly Work Practices & Supports	\$106,771	This Initiative is intended to create an awareness of the increasing need for family-friendly work practices and generate support for working families with young children via the business community. Employers may take advantage of 1:1 counseling, seminars and a user friendly website of research and economic and work supports.
Valley Oak Children's Services	Quality Counts (QC)	\$131,535	The program is a pilot designed to increase the quality of child care and early learning environments and to increase quality child care options for families. A number of elements from the CARES program are being implemented: Family Child Care Providers (FCCP) and Centers are assessed using the ECERS and can receive \$1,000 to assist in improving scores. Assistance is available to apply/renew or upgrade Child Development Permits. License Exempt Providers can receive up to 4 home visits per year for technical assistance, be paid for completing 15 hours of Health & Safety training and assistance with \$100 in support materials.
