**ACTION REQUESTED - CLARIFY AND INTERPRET INTENT OF ORIGINAL PROJECT LANGUAGE TO CONSIDER USING GRANT FUNDS TO PAY FOR 20 HOURS PER WEEK DISPATCH DUTIES INSTEAD OF CLERICAL DUTIES**

The Oroville Police Department received grant funding from the Committee in 2007 to fund additional clerical staffing hours to type police reports and perform miscellaneous duties, in order to free sworn police officers from administrative duties and allow them to spend more of their patrol shifts in the street instead of in the station.

In FY 2008-2009, the Department engaged the services of an independent transcription service, at a significantly reduced cost from funding additional clerical hours, which has allowed the part-time clerical position to remain unfilled.

The Department has a current vacancy in dispatch that due to budget constraints will not be filled. The Department's current plan is to use sworn police officers in dispatch. If the Department were to use grant funds to pay for 20 hours per week for dispatch, it would free sworn police officers from dispatch duties and allow them to spend more of their time in the street.

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**ACTION REQUESTED - REVIEW AND ADOPT ANNUAL REPORT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2009-2010 AND DIRECT THE REPORT BE SUBMITTED TO THE STATE PURSUANT TO LAW.**

California Government Code Section 12716 requires each county that administers grants from the Indian Gaming Special Distribution Fund to provide an annual report to the Chairperson of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee, the chairpersons of the Senate and Assembly committees on governmental organization, and the California Gambling Control Commission by October 1 of each year detailing the specific projects funded by all grants in the county's jurisdiction in the previous fiscal year, including amounts expended in that fiscal year, but funded from appropriations in prior fiscal years.

Submitted for your approval is the annual report for Butte County that meets the requirements of the Government Code. The form of this year's report is consistent with the form of prior year's reports and is based on a template provided to counties by the California State Association of Counties. The information in the report details the allocation and expenditure detail for grant recipients for the Fiscal Year 2009-2010 grant cycle.

The report details various information, including the amount of grant funds received by the county, a description of each project that is funded, a description of how each project mitigates the impact of tribal gaming, and the total expenditures for each project.

The report must be submitted by October 1 each year and any county that does not provide an annual report pursuant to the requirement will not be eligible for funding from the Indian Gaming Special Distribution Fund the following year. Upon your approval and adoption, staff will submit the report as required prior to the October 1 deadline.

Motion by Supervisor Lambert and second by Supervisor Connelly to adopt the Annual Report. Motion carried 3-0.

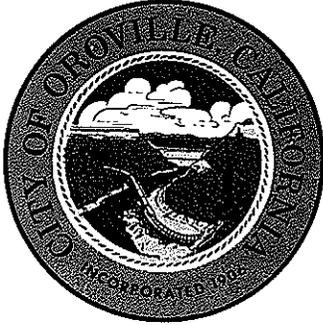

Dear Mr. Pickett,

The Oroville Police Department was a recipient of grant funding from the Committee in 2007. We write to request clarification on the award language and the appropriate use of the funding.

**Grant Objectives**

The objective of the grant project was to free our sworn police officers from administrative duties in order to allow them to spend more of their patrol shifts out on the street instead of in the station. Our proposal was initially conceived to fund additional clerical staffing hours to "type police reports and *perform miscellaneous duties.*" It is this language for which we seek clarification.

**Successful Redeployment of Sworn Police Officers**

Initially there was emphasis on redeployment of our sworn officers back into the field rather than spending time at a computer in the station authoring police reports. Grant funding was used to pay a part-time clerk typist and overtime hours for the Department's sole Records Technician which relieved some of the report typing burden on our sworn patrol staff. In FY 2008/09, the Department engaged the services of an independent transcription service. This significantly reduced the costs connected with producing police reports and put our officers back on the street. We continued with the transcription service in FY 2009/10, and did not fill the part-time clerk typist position. Officers dictate their reports into hand-held digital recorders and submit the audio files to our transcription service over the internet for typing. This use of technology and an outside transcription service has allowed the Department to provide more efficient patrol services in the City as our officers can dictate reports in the field.

**Non-Sworn Staffing Needs Have Changed**

With the success of the outside transcription service, the greater need is now in our Dispatch center. The Oroville Police Department typically employs seven full-time public safety dispatchers assigned to various shifts in our 24 hour communications center. One of these employees has resigned, leaving us short staffed. Due to City budget constraints and ongoing revenue shortfalls, we are unlikely to fill this position with a full-time dispatcher in the near term. We have other staff members who could potentially fill the holes in the schedule until a permanent solution is devised.

Two of our sworn officers started their careers as dispatchers and could cover the unfilled shifts. This solution, however, negates the success in achieving the original objective of the grant, which was to return our officers to the streets of Oroville. Utilizing a part-time non-sworn employee as a dispatcher is a better and more cost-effective solution.

**Clarification Requested**

We request the Committee provide a clarification and interpretation of the intent of the original project language. The project description requested funding to hire "a part-time clerk typist ... to type police reports and *perform miscellaneous duties*" (Attachment A-2006/2007 Special Distribution Fund Grant Application). We ask that the Committee allow the Oroville Department to utilize a portion of the remaining grant funds to pay a temporary part-time, 20 hour per week employee to work in our dispatch center instead of as a typist. This clarification would allow us to continue to have all of our sworn police officers performing patrol duties.

**Attachment A - Project Description**

Provide a complete description of the project –

This project will require the hiring of a part-time clerk typist and/or transcription service and/or the utilization of current manpower on an overtime basis to type police reports and perform miscellaneous duties.

The object of this project is to reduce the amount of time police officers spend investigating crimes and writing (typing) reports. We are a small agency with a massive amount of work and limited police officer resources. Rather than hire additional and more costly police officers, I am proposing a more cost effective and efficient way of doing business.

A common term used in law enforcement is the redeployment of resources. Redeployment is when sworn officers, currently employed by a police agency, becoming available to participate in Community Policing as a direct result of purchasing technology, equipment, or the hiring of civilian support staff. The utilization of technology and the hiring of less expensive civilian personnel is an effective and efficient way to do business.

The positions would be responsible for typing all police reports assigned to them, which have been dictated. It is much more cost effective to have police officers dictate reports than to type them. This frees the officers, so they are able to spend more hours on the street, helping to reduce the overall crime rate.

The cost breakdown for this proposal is as follows: \$32,000 per year will be expended towards the employment of a part-time typist and/or transcription service and/or utilizing current employees on an overtime basis. We are requesting a three year funding cycle. Total cost: \$96,000.

**Attachment B - Indian Gaming Impacts**

Provide a description of the impacts on your jurisdiction associated with the particular casino(s) from which accounts(s) the project would be funded. (Please include historical data, if available.)

Unfortunately, very little historical data is available, if any, since the two gaming facilities are outside the City's jurisdiction. However, Tyme Maidu Berry Creek Rancheria (Gold Country Casino) is literally 400 yards outside the City jurisdiction. The main route to get to the Gold Country Casino involve the utilization of Oro Dam Blvd. and Olive Highway. There are approximately three miles of City streets that are traversed in order to get to the Gold Country Casino from Highway 70. Ophir Road, which leads to Feather Falls Casino, traverses through the City limits of Oroville. Additionally, people coming and going between the two casinos utilized Lincoln Blvd., and Lower Wyandotte road, which are both within the City limits of Oroville. The Concow Maidu Mooretown Rancheria (Feather Falls Casino) is approximately 1.5 miles from the City limits.

The City of Oroville is a town of 14,000 people. The two casinos are the largest establishments on the outskirts of the City. There are no additional cities within a 25 mile radius or Oroville. The gaming at both casinos have both positive and negative influences on the City. The positive influences are certainly the number of visitors to the City of Oroville, who in turn spend money in our town. The negative aspect of the gaming industry is the people and the crime associated with the people. The crime associated with any establishment having a large volume of visitors has spilled over into nearby communities.

Currently, the Oroville Police Department is the busiest law enforcement agency in the County. Its officers provide police reports to victims and file complaints at the rate of 200% to 400% more, per officer, than any other department in the County. In order to substantiate this statement, you only need to refer to the yearly reports published by the District Attorney's Office for statistical verification. Additionally, the Oroville Police Department is responsible for all traffic accidents and traffic control within the City area. The California Highway Patrol handles the County area, and not the County Sheriff's Office. Traffic collisions within the Oroville area are the highest concentration of accidents within the County. Traffic congestion and drunk driving rates are both at an all time high. Additionally, the crime rate of Oroville is twice that of the National average. The cities of Gridley, Chico, and Paradise are half that of Oroville. The most recent information available is based on the 2004 Federal Bureau of Investigation crime reports. The national average is 3982.6 per 100,000 people. The City of Oroville's crime rate is 9835.2 per 100,000, Paradise is 4010.3, while Chico is 4450.3 per 100,000.

Oroville's highest stats are in the area of robberies, burglaries, larcenies, thefts, check forgeries, and motor vehicle thefts.

**Attachment C - Mitigation Objectives**

Provide an explanation of how the proposed project will mitigate impacts of the casino(s).

Crimes and calls for service do not occur at any one time or day of the week. In order to efficiently and effectively apply police services to the community, we must use technology and innovate personnel assignments. While I contend there is a direct relationship between a portion of the City's crime rate and the operation of the casinos, it is not feasible for any one or two people to handle all crime across the board. Therefore, rather than adding additional officers, which are expensive, to handle the variable work load, I would utilize a concept of called redeployment. Redeployment is accomplished by utilizing technology and civilian personnel who are less expensive than an officer. Oroville Police Officers type reports on computers at the police station. The volume of reports and typing keep officers off the streets. There is a need for the officers to fit in more time on the street, to implement Community Oriented Policing. A multi-faceted approach to resolving this problem involves the utilization of civilian personnel, coupled with the use of technology. Recently, this police department committed over \$400,000 to purchase new Computer Aided Dispatching and Records Management Systems. However, this new technology alone does not make the officer more efficient. Couple computer technology with this proposal to add the proposed positions, and selectively choosing the officers reports to be typed, will allow officers on heavy volume shifts to be freed up for more time on the streets.

Objectives:

- Reduce officers investigative and report writing time.
- Increase officers street time to proactively reduce crime.
- Officers become more efficient by dictating reports.
- Crime rates will decrease.
- Apprehension of suspects will increase.
- Quality of life will improve.

The Council meeting is video taped for release and play back on a public broadcast TV station at a later time.
- I would, in concurrence with the City Council, hold a press conference, and give a press release to the media (TV, radio, and newspaper) about the Tribal Casino Account and the amounts of money derived from which tribes.
- The police department's annual report would have a section of the funding of positions by the Tribal Casino Account and the names of the tribes which participated and the amounts thereof.
- I will speak with Channel 30 (Fox Station in Chico) to have a program on issues and answers, to discuss the contributions of Indian Gaming in the community.
