Meeting Minutes

March 15, 2017

I. CALL TO ORDER

- a. Chief Probation Officer, Steven Bordin, called the regular meeting of the Community Corrections Partnership (CCP) to order at 9:01 a.m., on March 15, 2017, in the Tahoe Room located at 202 Mira Loma, Oroville, California.
- b. Review of previous committee minutes from January 18, 2017. Chief Bordin asked for a motion to approve the minutes. Ron Reed gave a first and Michael O'Brien, with Mike Ramsey abstaining, gave a second. The remaining members were in favor and the motion passes.

II. SUB-GROUP COMMITTEE REPORTS/UPDATES

BUTTE COUNTY PROBATION

--- Dwayne Martin, Program Manager, reported out for Probation -- a handout was provided to the members. Mike Rogers, Supervising Probation Officer for the Re-Entry program gave a brief update on their year-to-date totals. This program has been a success so far. Jennifer Hard, Program Manager for the Treatment Courts spoke to the members about the submission of the Prop 47 grant application, which was submitted on February 21. The award announcements will be on June 16, 2017. With respect to the Treatment Courts, Jennifer stated they have had a visiting judge since January 1 and until they have a permanent judge assigned, they are in a "holding pattern" for any kind of major changes or adjustments. She also states she is completely revamping the manual for the policies and procedures for Drug Court.

BUTTE COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE

--- Lt. Hovey reported out for the ACS program. He states the current ACS population is 104, with 82 inmates assigned to programming and 35 inmates assigned to work crews. On April 7, they will be starting back with Fire Safe Council, servicing residential homes in the Paradise/Magalia area. Another dog was adopted out through the Sheriff's Second

Chance (K-9) program; the dog went to a veteran with PTSD. This dog will have further training to become a service dog. This dog will be the first service dog they have put through the program.

- Also reporting out for the Sheriff's Department on the ACS/HIDE program was Sgt. Lyon: Current ACS = 75; Current ACS DUI = 12; Current ACS / HIDE = 2; Fiscal Year To Date: Enrollments ACS = 155; Enrollments ACS DUI = 300; Enrollments; ACS/HIDE = 2; Time Served ACS = 87; Time Served ACS DUI = 266; Time Served; ACS/HIDE = 0

BUTTE COUNTY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

- Dorian Kittrell, Director of Butte County Behavioral Health reported on his department's statistics. Mr. Kittrell provided a handout to the members. He spoke about the Governor's proposed IHSS reform to shift costs to the counties with a 35% share of cost. He states this will create a significant general fund cost to his department, DESS and Public Health. They are also watching the ACA bill that will be submitted by Paul Ryan; if it were to pass, they are looking at a 30% to 40% decrease in funding over the next ten years for realignment.

BUTTE COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF EMPLOYMENT AND SOCIAL SERVICES

- Shelby Boston, Director of DESS, provided a handout to the members. She states her department is static. 233 active or pending cases; 16 clients seen at the DRC for February 2017. She also spoke briefly about the IHSS issue---there may be a supplement provided to the counties (new monies).

DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE

- District Attorney Mike Ramsey told the members that his department would have their year-end statistics available in approximately two weeks.

SUB-GROUPS/COMMITTEES

BUDGET SUB-GROUP

Chief Bordin asked Andy Pickett of Administration to report out on the CCP budget. He provided a handout. The ad hoc group came up with a status quo/conservative budget. Mr. Pickett did point out in the section titled, "One Time Funds" there is a new account called, "10% Growth to Local Innovation Subaccount" --- he states on the growth monies the county gets there is a portion that is set aside (not for CCP use) but for Board of Supervisors use. At this point Mr. Pickett asked each department to speak to their section. BCSO reports as static. Probation also reports as static; excluding the Program Manager that was approved by the members mid-year, last year. DESS reports as no changes. Behavioral Health states they have two minor changes. First due to under-utilization, they cut the original budget for the Psychiatrists in half; stating no impact to services. In addition, they changed the position of Clinician to a Behavioral Health Counselor to give them more flexibility in the field on services they can provide.

At this point, Mr. Pickett asked the CCP to approve the recommended budget.

VOTE: Dorian Kittrell moves with a first and recommends the budget be approved as written. Kory Honea seconds. No discussion or comments noted. All were in favor --- budget for FY 17/18 passes.

ADJOURNMENT OF REGULAR CCP MEETING – 9:27 a.m.

CALL TO ORDER OF TRANSITIONAL AGED YOUTH (TAY) STEERING COMMITTEE MEETING:

Chief Probation Officer, Steven Bordin, called to order the TAY Steering Committee at 9:28 a.m., on March 15, 2017, in the Tahoe Room located at 202 Mira Loma, Oroville, California.

Chief Bordin states the committee for the CCP has agreed to be the steering committee for the TAY program and will periodically bring that group forward for a review; this is the committee's first review. He would like the committee to discuss and approve the Risk Needs Assessment tool for the program.

Wayne Barley, Chief Deputy Probation Officer stated the committee has applied to the Board State Community Corrections (BSCC) as one of 5 counties in the state of California that were approved to work with 18, 19 and 20 year old offenders of who are non-violent, non-serious or non-sex offenders. The idea is to treat them as transitional age youth inside a specified pod within a Juvenile Hall, rather in jail or prison and provide them with some of the same programming the MCRP population are receiving. Approval was received from BSCC; this population will be housed in a separate pod within the hall. The Juvenile Hall will now be a "Co-Located Facility" and will be an adult jail along with the Juvenile Hall component. There will be three unique programs inside the hall, which include the TAY Program, Camp program and strictly detention services. This is a 3-year pilot program. They anticipate receiving their first individual into program as early as March 16, 2017. Mike Rogers has been assigned to oversee some of the programming aspects along with Ron Kimberling who has worked with the Re-Entry Program. Officer Kimberling has been assigned as the Probation Officer. Aaron Brown, who works internally in the hall, is the assigned supervisor to the program. Mike, Ron and Aaron are working closely on developing the program criteria. There will be an in-custody component along with developing what their criminogenic needs will be in addressing those early on while they are in custody; but then transitioning them back out into the community. There will also be some housing, educational and vocational components. They will also be working with the Comeback Butte Charter School. They will provide some educational components while they are in custody during that initial phase, but they will also go out to the charter school. They will also be working with Alliance Workforce Development, Tri-County Treatment and Juvenile/Probation staff. One of the components going forward is measuring success; this steering committee will be asked to start measuring data as it comes in; for the next three years. Darin Haerle of Chico State University has been asked to be on the committee to serve as an advocate. Greg Lynch, Assistant Chief Probation Officer of Probation stated they are looking at someone coming into the program to be one of the first female participants. Mr. Lynch stated that services would be extended to both male and female clients.

Dwayne Martin, Program Manager of Butte County Probation gave an overview of the program by applying the Static Risk Needs Assessment (SRNA). The SRNA is a fourth generation risk assessment tool. Approximately 27 counties use this tool within the state of

California. Butte County has been using it on their adult population since 2009. The need portion of the tool is also used by the Sheriff's Department.

Chief Bordin asks the steering committee to approve the use of the tool that Probation has identified as necessary for their process. Kory Honea makes a motion; Mike Ramsey seconds. All agree, no one opposes and there are no abstains. The motion passes.
